## LINKS

- The poem is filled with symbolism which can be related to The Picture of Dorian Gray and Intimate Maladies that also have symbols. For example, in the Picture of Dorian Gray there is the portrait of Dorian that symbolises different personalities and hidden secrets, there is also the mirror that symbolises beauty.
  - There are the themes of beauty, age and appearance which can be linked to the Picture of Dorian Gray, because beauty and appearance are something of a high importance in Dorian's life. There is also Sweet Bird of Youth, where Chance and Princess illustrate beauty and youth as something essential to living happy and creating your dreams.
- Throughout the poem Adrienne
  Rich uses 'you' to include the

  Handmaid's Tale, where Offred
  speaks to the reader through the

- In this poem there is a contrast between young love and old love as well as a back and forth between the past and present. This can be linked to Sweet Bird of Youth, due to there being a nostalgic love for Chance towards Heavenly, and how the story illustrates the differences between vouthful love and old love. And The Handmaid's Tale due to there being flashbacks through the story, hence the back and forth of the past and the present.
- There is a link with Robert
  Frost poems, more
  specifically "Tuft of
  flowers" because of the use
  of couplets in Adrienne
  Rich's poem and "To
  Earthward" because of the
  same theme of bitter sweet
  love, young & old love and
  how passionate young love
  can be.
- You can make the link to

  The Handmaid's Tale
  due to the theme of lack
  of freedom and a lack
  of women fighting for
  their rights, just like
  the poet who writes
  about nearly everything
  except for women's
  rights. And lack of
  women fighting for
  what was right before
  women lost all their
  freedom in Gilead.
  In addition, there is a link
- to Robert Frost's poems due to both poets having moments of self-reflection as well as talking about poetry through their poems.
- And then, you can make a link to the Tempest because Adrienne Rich gives the illusion of power from her poetry which is art, which can make you think of Prospero and is art

- This poem can be linked to
  The Handmaid's Tale
  because they both have a
  certain sense of warning.
  This poem warns about love
  being beautiful, but you
  should not be tricked by its
  beauty because it can
  destroy you. And in The
  Handmaid's Tale, Offred
  tries to give a warning to
  people who are still free to
  stay free and fights for
  their rights.
- You could also make a link to Sweet Bird Of Youth due to the theme of love being beautiful in the moment, but destroying you in the end. Just like Heavenly and Chance's love for each other, it was beautiful and youthful in the moment but left Heavenly heart-broken with a disease that could have destroyed her if she didn't have medical care.
- · And finally, you could make a link to The Handmaid's

use of 'you' – to include them in her life story, and in Robert Frost poems, who uses you to pull the reader into the scene, to fill part of his thoughts.  • Finally, there is the description of a woman's role in society which can be linked to The Handmaid's Tale, due to women being forced to either bare children and work for a household or to become a wife. ## LINKS

- This poem can be seen as a work that criticises the poet's society, which could be linked to one of Robert Frost's poems being "Stopping by the Woods on a Snowy evening", due to Frost criticising his society and their expectations.
- In addition, you could link this poem to **Intimate** Apparel due to its themes of women and their expectations of marriage. In this poem, E. Dickinson mocks society and how they force women to marry, giving them an expectation. She also speaks of women being unhappy before marriage and then unhappy once married. In Intimate Apparel, Esther is unhappy because she has no husband, no love, but then when she is married, she is
- Due to this poem's first stanza being constructed of an iambic pentameter, this poem can be linked to The Tempest by Shakespeare who uses iambic pentameter in a lot of his works.
- This poem can be linked to Sweet Bird of Youth due to the illusion of a 'bird' being out of reach. You can make a connection to **the** word bird being used in the title of the play, as well as in Dickinson's **poem.** Also, the **bird** represents hope in this poem but in **Sweet bird of Youth** it represents a dream that is always there but also always out of reach, just like Chance's love for Heavenly, it's always there, in his heart and head but it's also always out of reach.
- Staying with the theme of the bird we can also make a link to Robert Frost's poem "The Wood

- There is a link to the Handmaid's Tale due to their being a theme of lack of control, which represents perfectly Offred's life because she has no control, the only control she has in her life is in her head and even that can get out of control.
- In addition there is a link to Sweet Bird of Youth because there is the same theme of losing track of reality. In this poem, there is a difficulty to stay in reality - to not be pulled into the spiraling out of control thoughts. And in the play, Chance loses sight of what's real, he only sees what he wants to see, what he believes in. Just like how Princess uses drugs

- disappointed and unhappy. Also, you could make a link to the Interpreter of Maladies with the story "Blessed House" because in this story there is a theme of difficulties of marriage.
- There is also a link to the Tempest, because Dickinsonwrites/ mocks women being owned from one man (your father) to another (your husband). Just like Miranda is owned by her father Prospero before being handed over to Ferdinand.
- Due to this poem being a feminist criticism of marriage you could make a link to A. Rich poem "Snapshots of a daughter in law", because Rich also criticises marriage and wishes for a better life for a girl described in her

- Pile". Because the bird in Frost's poem represents a youthful person who shows the poet guidance where as here in Dickinson's poem the bird is seen as hope, something that is always there to comfort you.
- You could also make a link to another of Frost poem's being "Unstamped letter in our rural letter post box", because the bird represents a sense of freedom through the description of nature used in this poem. Which can also be seen in Frost's poem with the homeless man who finds comfort through the trees through the

 And finally, you could talk about the contrast between this poem and <u>The Tempest</u> over how Porspero, the main character has complete control over everyone's life. He is the man with the magic and his life never spirales out of control.
